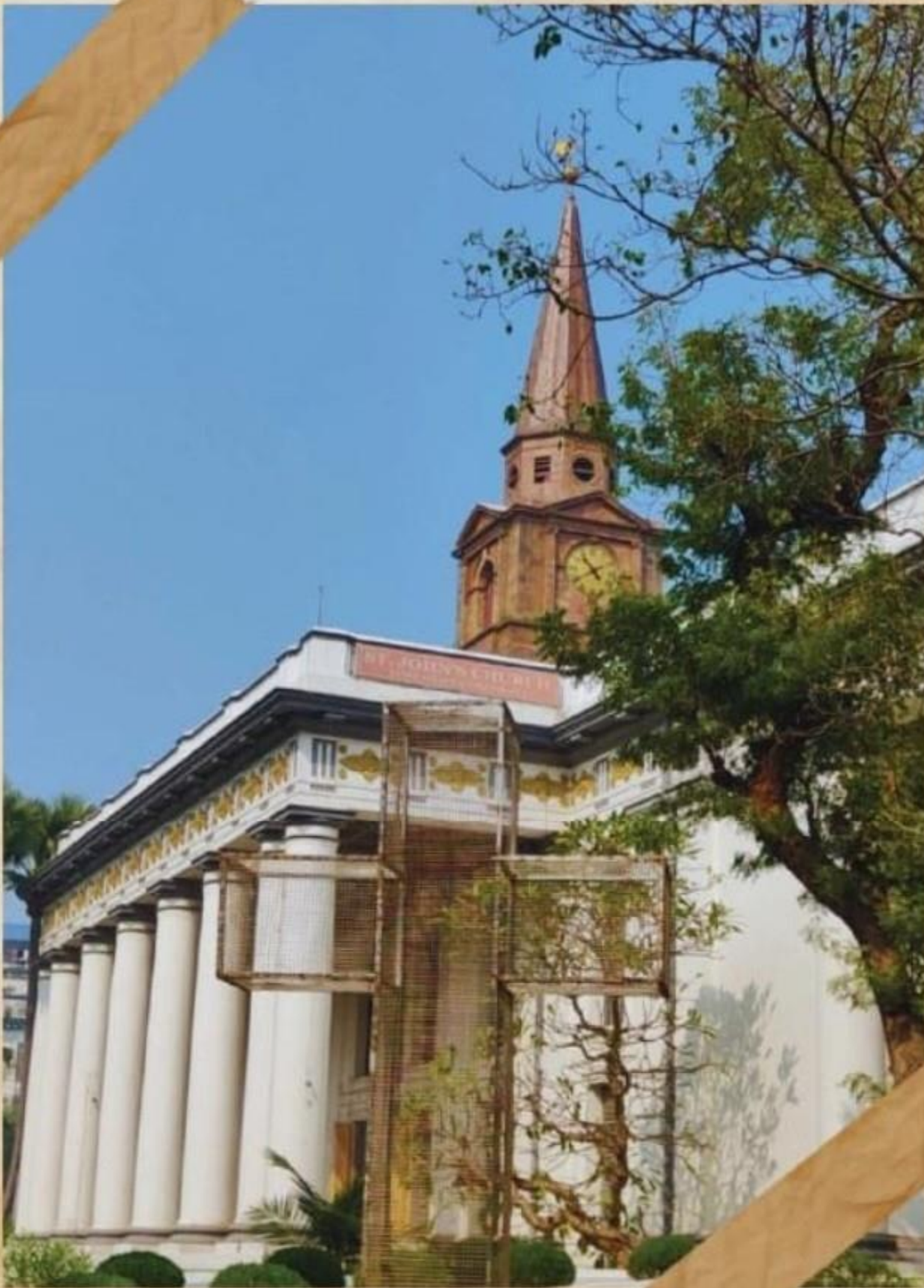

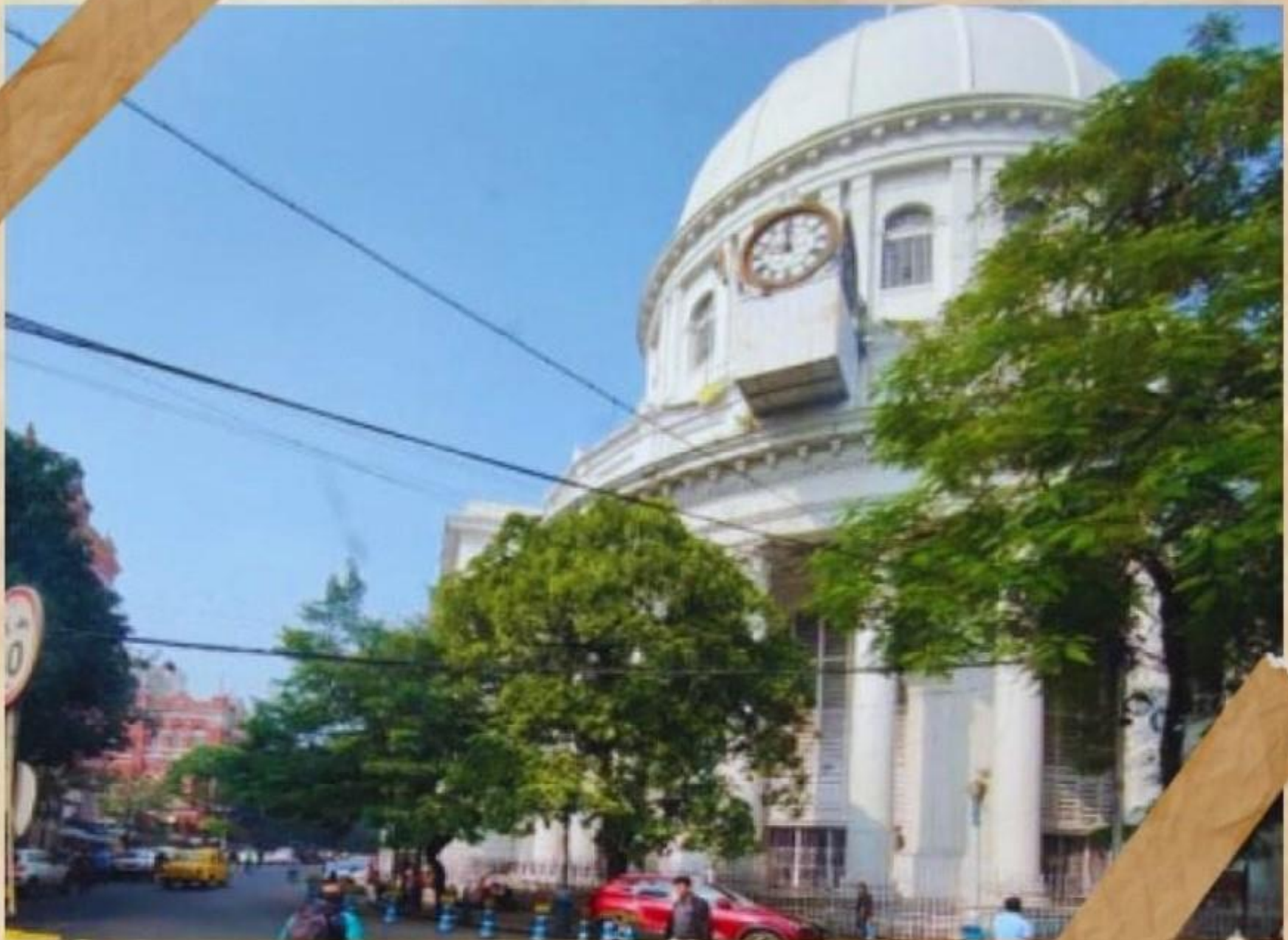
Bow Barracks

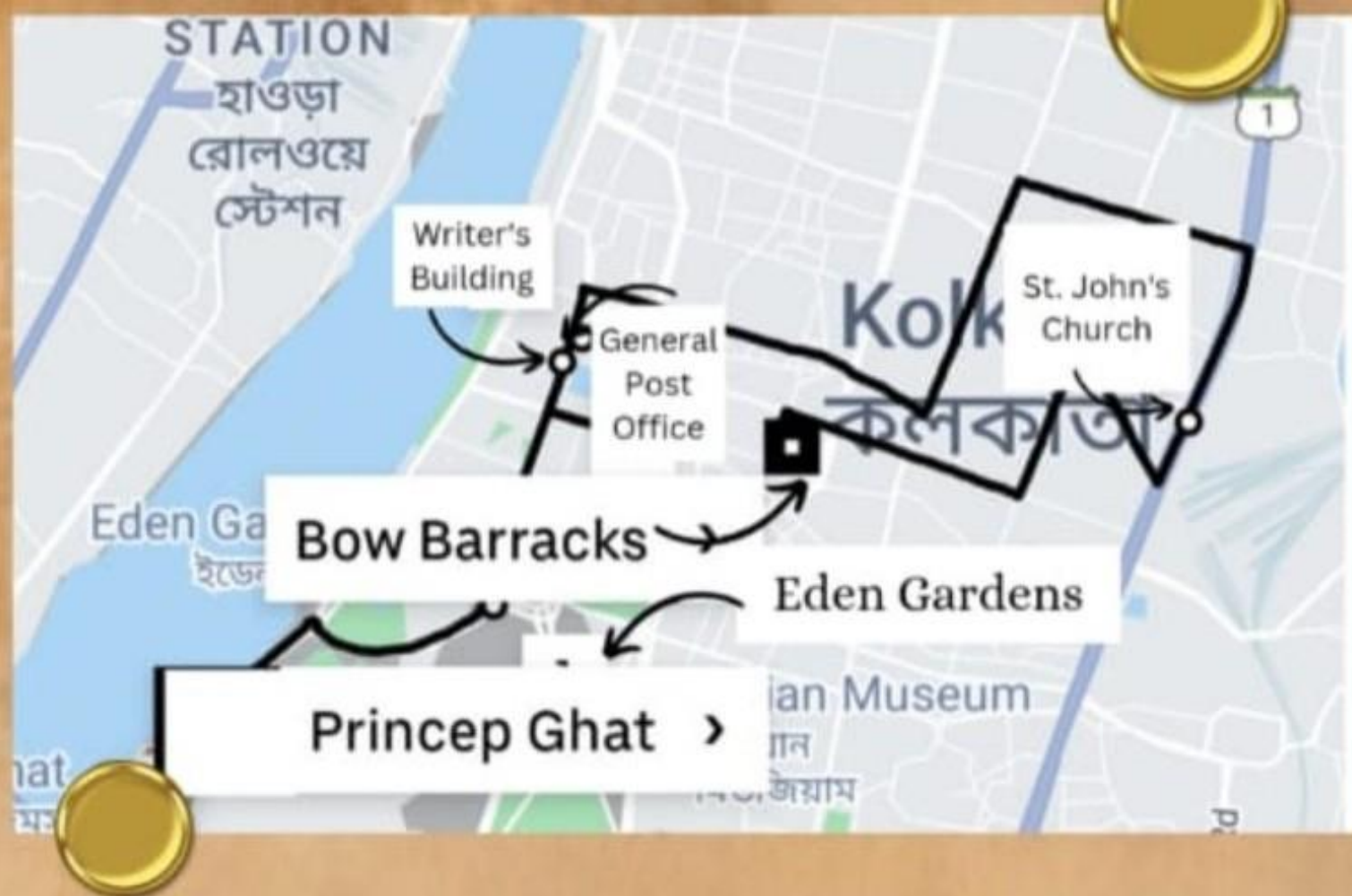
